The PCA proficiency certificate manuals underwent a makeover earlier this year. They are now in circulation and you can order them from the PCA Shop in JustGo.

Compared to previous editions they contain more interactive activities, pages for rider notes and an updated section on welfare. Riders are still able to use the previous editions, especially if they have already started working on a certificate.

Clean Sport Means Horses Too

In 2022, Pony Club Australia adopted the **National Integrity** Framework and riders competing at national and international level will soon learn of the importance of "clean sport".

Our international coaches and competitors are completing the mandatory courses on prohibited substances that are required by Sport Integrity Australia. However, when Pony Club members think about drugs in sport, it isn't the rider that is top of mind.

The <u>PCA Horse Medication Policy</u> will be fully implemented from the beginning of 2024. If your horse is on a medication that is on the FEI banned substances list, you will need to get a veterinary certificate to provide to event organisers for competitions.

Check the policy and ask your vet on their next visit.

Event organisers should also include a statement in the event schedule stating the requirements for riders to get a Therapeutic Use Exemption.




AGM and Annual Report

Changes to the B certificate

There have been changes to the B Certificate for riders not wishing to jump, called the **B Certificate – Alternative.** It is equivalent to the B Certificate except riders cannot be selected for national or international teams requiring B certificate standard, which involves jumping.

The B Certificate – Alternative requires candidates to understand the concepts of jumping from the point of view of rider and horse, but they do not actually have to demonstrate jumping themselves. They also need to have a basic understanding of course-building.

In place of jumping, the **B Certificate - Alternative** candidate chooses an alternative ridden discipline to study, and achieve a high proficiency. MORE: Page 12



Welfare Wednesdays



Taking your horse's temperature

Normal temp is 37.5 - 38.5C

Welfare Wednesday

Knowing what is normal temperature for your horse will make it much easier for you to take good observations for your vet, and to know when to call a vet.

If your horse's temperature is above his normal range

To take a horse's temperature:

get vet advice quickly.

- Have your horse securely tied or someone holding him.
- Let your horse know you are near his rump, with a pat
- Stand slightly to the side, lift the tail and slide a digital thermometer into the rectum
- Angle it slightly to ensure it sits near the rectum wall
- If you push it into the middle, you may be inserting it into a ball of manure which will affect the reading.

On The Sidelines

with PCA Ambassador Talicia Beardsmore



Hello,

As well as an active Pony Club rider, I am a horse breaker/trainer. I have been working with horses for many years now and luckily up until now have only had a few bumps and bruises.

However a few weeks ago I had an unfortunate fall. Before I was able to get up my right leg got tangled in the horse's legs. This resulted in me doing a grade 2 sprain to my MCL and needing 4-6 weeks off. I was incredibly lucky to have walked away with nothing too major, but I would be lying if I said this time off had been easy.

I was devastated once I learnt how much time I would have to spend away from horses. I am an incredibly active person and ride an average of 20 horses a day so as you can understand this was going to be very hard for me. I'm not one to sit for long so the first thing I did was plan how I was going to spend my time. Considering I wasn't even able to be around the horses for the first couple weeks I was limited to things I could do in my house.

I was wise with my time and started projects I hadn't had time to do due to my busy lifestyle. The first

thing I did was start a podcast as I've been wanting to do that for years! It's called "Unedited by Talicia Beardsmore". I use this platform to discuss mindset, business, horses, life and the pressures of social media. With only two episodes out, it has sky rocketed into the Australian Leisure Podcast Charts at #7!

Aside from that I have taken a big liking to reading, where I find myself immersed in learning about many different horsemanship styles and methods from all over the world. Just because I am unable to go outside and work with horses it doesn't mean I can't still learn new techniques!

I ride an average of 20 horses a day so as you can understand this was going to be very hard for me.

This time has also been helpful for me to catch up on a lot of my marketing work and plan for the rest of the year. I have written up a schedule for both myself and my horses as we ease back into work and competing. Not putting any pressure on ourselves but just having a written plan to work from.

I have also planned for the upcoming breeding season, spending countless hours studying stallions and going through them with a fine tooth comb to pick which ones best suit my mares.

I was determined to get my knee healed as quickly as I could so I have religiously stuck to my physio's recommendations and exercises. Alongside that I treated my knee with TuffRock Body Mud multiple times a day to reduce the heat and swelling. Because I have looked after myself the best way I could I was lucky enough to get the great news from my physio that I can get back to riding next week! This means I will have only had one month off. It definitely pays off sticking to the physio's wise words!

- Summary of changes Proficiency Manuals Update 2023



The updated manuals have new covers to easily see the difference. Riders will not be disadvantaged if they use the previous edition.

ALL manuals have:

- new front covers to distinguish them from the earlier versions.
- coloured tabs to help members find the different sections (eg On the Ground, In the Saddle)
- a page or pages for note making after each section
- some minor spelling and grammatical corrections
- some extra photos and/or diagrams to help with understanding
- some extra or different activities to try after they read new information; some were repetitive
- reduction of repetition between successive manuals where possible. Some repetition has been left to help members recall what they learned previously, as some can have a fairly long period between attempting the next level.
- Whips have been deleted from groundwork photos prior to C* and K level.
- Apart from the first level manuals, there are references to the new PCA Welfare Policy, introduced in 2022, which can be found on the PCA website. This involves explaining the Five Domains of Horse Welfare in various levels of detail
- Most manuals now have a place to tick off activities and exercises when they have been tried, and make notes about how it went if they wish. For example:



Individual changes

E Manual

- Diagrams of tying a quick release knot have been added, and a link to the PCA YouTube channel to watch a video
- Photos and descriptions have been added to describe mounting from the ground; previously only mounting from a mounting block was explained.

D* and D* Older Rider Manuals

- Diagrams of tying a quick release knot have been added, and a link to the PCA YouTube channel to watch a video
- The six responses first mentioned at the start of 'On The Ground' have been simplified. The words in capitals have been deleted. They now read:

Stop, go forward, turn THE SHOULDERS left (and) turn THE SHOULDERS right, move the hindquarters left and move the hindquarters right. The last two are only named, not described, the same as in previous editions of this manual.

- Eight different types of saddles and their purposes are shown and an activity added asking the member to match the photo to the name
- A photo of measuring the tightness of a noseband was changed from holding two fingers vertically to holding them horizontally.

C Manual

- A photo of measuring the tightness of a noseband was changed from holding two fingers vertically to holding them horizontally.
- The dressage arena diagrams were changed to demonstrate a more suitable 40x20 arena not a 60x20 arena and the extra letters removed to avoid any confusion.
- The poster of the Five Domains of Horse Welfare added. It can also be found on the PCA website to download.
- A poster showing the Body Condition Score of a horse has been added. It can also be found on the PCA website to download.
- The stirrup iron fitting measurements updated to match the National Gear Rules. The NGR is available on the PCA Website

B Manual

- There is now a quick reference guide near the start of the manual to help riders remember the series of definitions used.
- The Non-Jumping option in the B Manual has been changed, including the non-jumping riders not having to jump a small number of 85cm x 85cm jumps.
- Riders who achieve the B Certificate with Non-Jumping Option are not eligible to be selected for national and international teams which include jumping.
- Some changes made to the lungeing section (mostly to shorten it) as PCA now has a Lungeing Manual on the website, which is free to download.

Here are the highlights of what to expect from the new updates for Event Management:


Event Booking Transfers


A new Emails & Communications tile will replace the existing Club Email Tile



Segment

What is a Segment? Segments are criteria that allow administrators to identify a unique group of members to send communication. Administrators can name segments and add description for future use. Multiple segment rules can be added using the ADD button, and rules behavior can also be defined using the drop down.

For example – If club administrators want to sent emails to only Junior Members, the new Email and Communications tile will come with pre-loaded segments such as Junior Riding Members, Senior Riding Members, All Members etc.




A brand new Email Template Builder

WHAT DOES THIS POLICY COVER?

 Illegal Drugs - Relevant Persons must not use, possess or traffic illegal drugs in Pony Club.

Every person who is a member of Pony Club or bound

by our policies must abide by the Improper Use of

Drugs in Sport Policy. Relevant persons in the policy

however are national or international riders and may

depend on the circumstances these riders are in.

- Sport Science and Sport Medicine Personnel identifies appropriate people to work with Pony Club members in a paid or voluntary capacity.
- Medication details requirements for athletes who need to take medications for therapeutic purposes which are on the banned list and may require a Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE).
- Injections details requirements for athletes who need to inject themselves such as diabetics.
- Supplements details the organisation's approach to supplement use. Caution should be exercised when using supplements, banned substances may be contained even in tested batches.

SPORT INTEGRITY APP

The Sport Integrity APP is a great resource for athletes and support personnel to find information and find out about banned substances.

What is this program?

Pony Club is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in our activities, by ensuring that everyone involved in Pony Club is educated and informed of their responsibilities to protect and look after children. Pony Club Australia, believe child safeguarding is everyone's business. The Child Safeguarding Club Program is a series of checklists to help your club systematically put in place practices that help to create a child-safe environment at your club.

Does our club need to do this program?

The Child Safeguarding Club Program is a voluntary program however every club must ensure they are aware of and implement child safe practices at their club. The Child Safeguarding Club Program aims to help clubs systematically make changes or think about how we as an organisation can promote and provide a child-safe environment for children participating in Pony Club.

How does the program work?

The Child Safeguarding Club Program is a series of checklists aimed at helping your club to identify activities or actions to undertake to help embed child-safe practices at your club. We recommend you set an agenda item and circulate the checklist then check off the actions or activities on the list. If your club has done everything on the list, great! if not nominate someone to put in place what you don't have!

3. Education & Training

Our next focus in the program is Education and Training. Education and training help us to understand obligations, update our knowledge or reaffirm our understanding. Coach qualifications and the Child Safeguarding in Sport Induction course form some very important aspects of this part of embedding child-safe practices at your club.

3. Education & Training

Education & Training are important activities to ensure we can develop the people who undertake roles in our clubs and assist in consistently delivering our Pony Club program.

The Child Safeguarding in Sport Induction course has been developed to help people understand what the Child Safeguarding Policy says and why it is important. There is a very large spectrum of child

abuse with some forms witnessed every week in a sporting context. We need as many people as possible to know what child abuse looks like and know what to do if we see it in our organisation.

It is essential all club committees and coaches undertake the Child Safeguarding in Sport Induction course to ensure the leaders of our organisation understand this policy and know what to do if it is breached!

Qualified Coaches/Instructors are an important step toward a child-safe environment in Pony Club. Pony Club prides itself on being an educational organisation. Our coaches/instructors deliver the Pony Club syllabus to ensure our coaches/instructors are delivering the Pony Club program to its highest training is a vital step!
